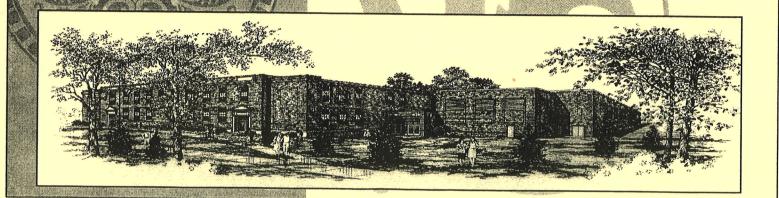

Dear Sackets Harbor Central School District Residents:

The Annual Budget and School Board of Education Vote for residents of the Sackets Harbor School District will be Tuesday, May 17, 2011 from 1:00 PM to 8:00 PM in the Huttemann Gymnasium lobby. A public hearing to present the District's proposed budget will be held on Tuesday, May 10, 2011 at 7:00 PM in the school Multi Purpose Room (MPR).

Our planning and preparation of this budget was difficult, but with the adoption of our New York State budget in a timely manner, the financial facts and figures were in front of us. Our district initially saw a 12.83% (\$492,899) decrease in state aid proposed in Governor Cuomo's Executive Budget. In the final budget however, a restoration of \$77,232 was brought back to the district. These numbers, coupled with contractual obligations, retirement, and energy costs made the task of formulating a spending plan quite difficult. The following measures have been taken to create this budget that represents a **0% budget increase** (spending plan) for the second straight year and an estimated **1.96% tax levy increase**:

- ✓ Reduction of 3 Full Time Equivalent Positions
- ✓ Increased use of fund balance to offset the tax levy
- ✓ Utilization of Federal Jobs Bill monies for Instructional salaries
- ✓ Evaluated and reduced, as necessary, BOCES Services
- ✓ Elimination of District Computer Coordinator (BOCES) Assignment
- ✓ Reduction of salaries due to retirements
- ✓ Decrease in professional development offerings, workshop participation, and conference attendance
- ✓ Reduction in material, equipment, and non-essential purchases

Voters will have an opportunity to cast a vote on the proposed budget of **\$7,900,835**. In a separate proposition, voters will decide whether the District may purchase one bus not to exceed \$110,901 as a replacement for a bus in our fleet. The local cost for the bus is \$18,007 or \$3,601 each year for five years. This purchase is important to keep our transportation fleet in a replacement rotation that is not interrupted and would result in costly repairs. School district transportation vehicles must pass stringent Department of Transportation inspections and specifications that our personal vehicles are not subject to.

Voters will elect one member to the Board of Education for a five year term. There are two candidates running for the seat being presently held by Gregg A. Townsend. **Hélène Stewart-Rainville** and **Gregg A. Townsend** are the two candidates seeking election to fill this Board of Education seat.

New York State aid to public schools is determined by a combination of property wealth and personal income of district residents. Sackets Harbor has experienced a steady decline in state aid for the last eleven years. In this year's New York State Budget, Foundation aid provided to all districts has been frozen at the 2008-2009 level, as well as a reduction of 1.2 billion dollars, which is the largest reduction in state history.

We are dedicated to providing an outstanding education to our young people despite the economic situation facing New York State. The BOE, Superintendent Hall, and Business Office have established short term and long range fiscal over-sight and planning to minimize fluctuations on the local taxpayers. The district continues to manage fund balance to help weather the realities of a recession plagued economy and maintain stability. We are proposing a 1.96 % tax levy increase which is in keeping with the Governor's potential 2% tax cap. Our Teachers' Association and staff have made concessions and **all Sackets Harbor Central employees** will receive **no salary increases** to assist in working through what is termed one of the most difficult budget years in history.

Our small school district provides an incredibly positive climate and culture for learning. We suffered some traumatic losses in our community and school district that have strengthened our resolve. Having lost a young alumnus and local fire fighter, a talented retired Music teacher and an active English teacher has reminded us that Sackets Harbor is fiercely loyal and embracing place. We have shown great collaboration to bring about a spending plan that eliminates positions, but not people. This, along with maintaining a rigorous amount of course offerings was a high priority for us as we formulated this budget.

Students are afforded opportunities to graduate with Advanced Placement (AP) credits in English and US History, JCC English credits and Distance Learning (Psychology, Sociology, Business Management, Principals of Management, and Calculus) coursework. On an annual basis we induct students into the National Honor Society, Junior National Honor Society, and the Spanish National Honor Society. We have extracurricular activities that meet a broad array of student interests such as Patriot Pals, Patriot Impact, Envirothon, Forensics, Library Club, SPARK, SPARK Junior, Sentinels Marching Band, Chorus, Whiz Quiz, Ski Club to name a few. We also offer a full complement of sporting teams and Co-ed Cheerleading.

Included are highlights from the Sackets Harbor Central New York State Report Card. Our students, faculty and staff work hard to ensure that every student can reach their full potential and meet the demands of a sound educational program. The New York State Education Department changed the Grades 3-8 ELA cut scores which have changed the format in which we report these results from past years. The District has denoted mathematics as its highest priority for curriculum alignment and development.

We continue to be proud of our school, our students, faculty, staff, and the continued collaboration between our school and community. We ask for your support by voting on May 17, 2011.

### **BOARD OF EDUCATION CANDIDATES**

#### Candidate Hélène Stewart-Rainville

<u>Family & Community</u>: I have lived in the District for five years and have two children who attend SHCS. As the spouse of an active duty soldier, who will soon deploy for an eighth tour of combat, I am aware of the challenges that face military families. Volunteerism has been part of my life for three decades. At the Fire Department, I volunteer as an EMT and firefighter. Also, I have held membership at the Church of St. Andrew, the Chamber of Commerce, and AANNY.

Experience: My executive committee experience goes back to 1985, where I held positions on many political boards. At Sackets, I served on the PTO board for one year, and as the Fire Department EMS Coordinator. As a founding and executive member of the Canadian Association of Military Professionals, I helped launch an advocacy group. In education, I worked as a language instructor both in private industry and for the University of North Carolina. As a full-time substitute at one of the country's largest school districts, I taught grades PK-12 and special education. My financial background includes working for both the US Army and the Government of Canada in accounting where I was responsible for multimillion dollar check transfers.

Education: I graduated from the University of Quebec with a Certificate of Industrial Relations, and a Bachelor of Social Sciences (Political Science) from the University of Ottawa. This month, I will complete a Bachelor of Science (Emergency Management) at Empire State College. Other studies include graduate coursework in Aeronautical Science (Management & Safety) and undergraduate Political Science studies at UNC with minors in Secondary Education, History, Mathematics, Biology and Chemistry. I am a Nationally Certified Firefighter and continue to take NYS Fire Courses.

### Candidate Gregg A. Townsend

Candidate Gregg A. Townsend was born and raised in Sackets Harbor. Gregg and his wife Eileen reside at 20120 Morin Lane North with their children McKenzie (SHS Class of 2009), Olivia (SHS Class of 2010), Alexandra (9<sup>th</sup> grade) and Luke (7<sup>th</sup> grade).

Gregg graduated from Clarkson University in 1985 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil and Environmental Engineering. I have been a licensed Professional Engineer since 1990, and have worked as an Environmental Engineer with the NYSDEC for 26 years. I am presently the Regional Engineer in the NYSDEC's Watertown office. I was first elected to the Sackets Harbor Central School Board of Education in 2001, and currently serve as President. I recently completed my first year as coach of the Varsity Girls' basketball team, guiding them to the Section III Class D finals. In 2003, Eileen and I opened the Lovin' Spoonful ice cream shop on Main Street in the village, now Saturdays, Sundaes and More.

Gregg states, "During my years of service on the Board of Education, I have had the privilege of working with outstanding administrators, faculty, staff and fellow Board members. This has never been more evident to me than in the past couple years when we have been faced with crippling cuts to State aid and an ever-growing list of unfunded mandates. Despite such adversity, we continue to provide an educational culture for our children that is simply not available in larger school districts, while at the same time being fiscally responsible to our taxpayers. The opportunity to continue to serve as a member of the Board of Education would truly be an honor."

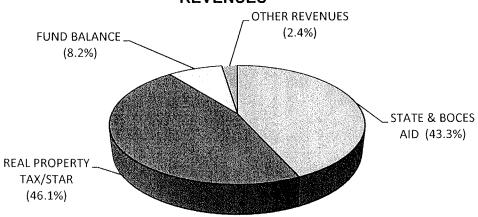

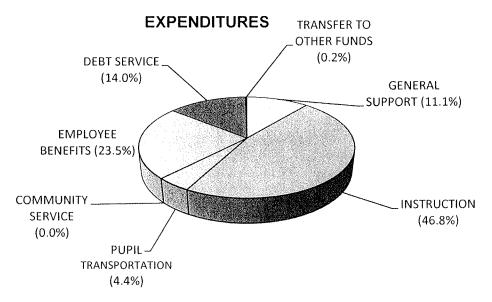

This number represents all pupils, including those classified as having disabilities and those not classified, excluding only students with disabilities placed out of district. For districts in which a county jail is located, this number includes incarcerated youth to whom the district must provide an education program.

Instructional Expenditures for Special Education are K-12 expenditures for students with disabilities (including summer special education expenditures) plus a proration of building-level administrative and instructional support expenditures. The total cost of instruction for students with disabilities may include both general and special education expenditures. Special education services provided in the general education classroom may benefit students not classified as having disabilities.
